"But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be added unto you," (Matt 6:33). You'll find yourself spending less on junk and more on what's important, such as helping others out, paying off your debts, and saving. God's a pretty good financial advisor.

Seeking first God's kingdom in your finances is something that isn't mastered overnight. Yet it all starts in your heart and how you view your money. Jesus said very clearly that no one can serve two masters. They will either love one and hate the other or cling to one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and your insatiable love of money and material things. It's impossible. This comes in very handy when you're pursuing righteousness in the way you handle your finances. Somehow, knowing that it's all God's, that He knows what's best for you, and that His will is what matters most gives you a peace when you're dealing with your money, or should I say, God's money, because that's what it really is.
